FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

"Christmas time is here. Happiness and cheer. Fun for all that children call, Their favorite time of the year." From a Charlie Brown Christmas

May we never lose the happiness and cheer. May we never grow out of the childlike spirit of it being the favorite time of year. And if you have grown out of it and lost that childlike spirit, may you recover it this Christmas season.

What does Christmas signify? To a degree, it's the standard things. It's "the holidays," which can be code for STRESSFUL! It's the decorating, baking, shopping, parties, extended family gatherings, exchanging gifts, the bad weather, how early it gets so dark, and just the overall general busyness between Thanksgiving and New Year's...it all adds up quickly. It can be easy for us to get lost in what the season is about.

And don't worry, this isn't yet another "so you better remember the reason for the season or else!" post. If you're reading this, I'm 100% sure you know it's about Jesus birth.

We are on the precipice of the madness. Christmas commercials are already playing, people are decorating their yards and houses, and people are starting to buy presents. None of that is bad. But think of it like a church service. When do you get the most out of a church service? Is it when you are going 35mph in a 25mph zone because you're running late, you walk in 5 minutes after the service has started, and by the time you catch your breath from hurrying to get to church, the preacher is already in their 2nd point. We've all been there at one time or another...but we can all agree that you're not getting the most out of that church service.

Compare that to when you wake up in the morning, you spend 15 minutes reading scripture, then spend another 10 minutes in prayer. While getting dressed and eating breakfast, you have worship music playing. You arrive at church early to join the 830am prayer meeting for 30 minutes, and then greet and fellowship with people as they walk in the doors of the church. You're in your seat 5 minutes before the service starts, and when it starts, you're fully engaged because you've spent the whole morning getting ready for worship with your family in Christ.

It's the same with the Christmas season. Spend a few minutes this week and next reading the Christmas story in **Matthew 1:18-2:23** and **Luke 1:26-2:40**. Consider it.

Read through the verses in Isaiah that talk about Jesus.

Isaiah 40:3–5: The announcement of Jesus' coming.

Isaiah 7:14: The virgin birth of Jesus.

Isaiah 61:1: The proclamation of the good news

Isaiah 52:13–53:12: The sacrificial death of Jesus

Isaiah 60:2-3: Jesus' return to claim His own

Take a few moments before the craziness that is the season of Holidays and prepare your heart. Get it ready so that you get the most out of this time.

Black Sheep...

This is how the birth of Jesus the Messiah came about: His mother Mary was pledged to be married to Joseph, but before they came together, she was found to be pregnant through the Holy Spirit. Because Joseph, her husband, was faithful to the law, and yet did not want to expose her to public disgrace, he had in mind to divorce her quietly. But after he had considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins" (Matthew 1:18-21, NIV).

Almost every family has black sheep. A rebel who can't seem to toe the line, another is making news because of an embarrassing antic. They are the ones in the family picture that others step away from so they are not closely affiliated.

Jesus had black sheep in His family. When we read through Jesus' genealogy in Matthew 1, we find prostitutes, adulterers, murderers, idol worshipers, and every other sort of black sheep. Not the kind of pedigree we might expect for the Savior of the world.

And then there's Mary. Mary is found to be with child before marriage—a stigma in their society. We know how that news landed on her fiancé Joseph. He was embarrassed. He knew he wasn't the father. He had in mind to leave her "quietly."

In His sovereignty, God cleared up the matter for Joseph in a dream, but what about the rest of Mary's family? Her closest friends? Her community? It's likely that Jesus walked under a cloud of shame all His life because some could never accept such a fantastical story as a virgin conception. In their minds, Mary, and Jesus Himself, would always be black sheep.

God is apparently perfectly OK with that. In fact, black sheep are exactly the sort of people Jesus came for: "you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins" (Matthew 1:21, ESV).

Jesus really had no other option than to come through a family tree with broken branches, a family tree like yours and mine. Every one of us is a black sheep. But I say, thank God for the perfect Lamb who came to save black sheep like you and me.

Let us pray together.

"Jesus, thank You for coming as the perfect Lamb to save black sheep like me – wash me with Your precious blood and make me white as snow. Amen."

"Are you ready for Christmas?" We hear that question asked a lot during the month of December. It can certainly raise panic in our hearts, but amid all the responsibilities and expectations of the season, may we take time for the most important thing: the preparation of our hearts. I invite you to be sure to pick up one of the Advent devotionals, "Embracing the Gift of God's Grace," located on the Welcome Center and then allow it to help you get truly ready--spiritually ready--to celebrate our Savior's birth.
